

COVID-19 Testing Coverage for the Uninsured

There are two programs that cover uninsured individuals for COVID-19 testing and testing related services. One of these programs also covers treatment costs for the uninsured for COVID-19 related treatment, the federal Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) claims reimbursement program for providers. There are other key differences to these programs and this document will outline what each program entails and how they can be accessed.

HRSA COVID-19 Claims Reimbursement to Health Care Providers and Facilities for Testing and Treatment of the Uninsured

Health care providers who have conducted COVID-19 testing or provided treatment for uninsured individuals with a COVID-19 diagnosis on or after February 4, 2020 can request claims reimbursement through the program electronically and will be reimbursed generally at Medicare rates, subject to available funding. Steps will involve: enrolling as a provider participant, checking patient eligibility, submitting patient information, submitting claims, and receiving payment via direct deposit.

COVID-19 Uninsured Testing Coverage Through Medicaid

Utah Medicaid will now cover COVID-19-related diagnostic testing and services for uninsured individuals. This new program will be effective through the duration of the public health emergency. Covered services include COVID-19 testing, as well as serological tests to determine the presence of the virus antibodies. Related services covered include the administration of the test and evaluations related to testing, such as x-rays.

- Uninsured individuals are eligible for the new "COVID-19 Uninsured Testing Coverage" without regard to income or assets.
- To qualify, an individual must be uninsured, and meet citizenship and Utah residency requirements.
- Individuals are considered uninsured if they are not enrolled in another federal health care program, such as Medicare or Veterans Health Administration coverage, or a commercial group or individual health plan.
